Traditional Nlakapamux Self Introduction



Sometimes you will be asked ste? he? skwést (shtah ha shkwesht), meaning what is your name? One of the ways Indigenous people like to connect with one another is through nkseytkn (family). A traditional introduction will include where you and your family come from, who your parents are, as well as your grandparents on both sides of your family. A traditional introduction should also be used in group settings, welcoming's, speeches, or where ever you feel necessary. This is a great way of connecting with your nlaka'pamux culture and people! You will soon get to learn more nkseytkn!
